Cook's Corner Roasted Red Pepper Soup & Turkey or Chicken & Pesto Sammies

Happy New Year! I hope you all had a wonderful, relaxing holiday season. I'm sure you're all back to work and school and I know how crazy it can feel when you're getting back into your routine. Here are two healthy and hearty recipes that will make things easier for your weeknights. The Roasted Red Pepper Soup is a lovely bowl of goodness. It's truly a 'blender' dish, and pairs well with sammies and salads. It's not spicey, it's uncomplicated, rich and satisfying. It's also a beautiful color, appealing to all of our senses. The turkey or chicken sammies are guick and tasty. Make your soup, pull the sammies together, get out the paper plates and let this day go. Smile! Tomorrow awaits! Enjoy. MP Christakos

Roasted Red Pepper & Ricotta Soup

2 & 1/2 cups chicken broth

1 cup Ricotta cheese

½ cup Half & Half (fat-free is fine)

½ tsp ground black pepper

1 (16 oz) jar roasted red peppers, rinsed & coarsely chopped

1 garlic clove

1 TBSP lemon juice

1/8 to ¼ tsp (or a dash) of cayenne pepper

½ tsp coarse salt

1 TBSP fresh chives, chopped

Combine first 6 ingredients in a blender and process until smooth.

Pour mixture into a large saucepan and heat over medium to a simmer. Stir in lemon juice, cayenne and salt. Heat thoroughly.

Serve topped with fresh chopped chives, if desired; or with a few rounds from the black pepper grinder.

Turkey or Chicken & Pesto Sammies

1 loaf of soft French bread or brioche rolls Store-bought pesto sauce

Sliced deli turkey, or pre-cooked "grilled" frozen chicken patties

Swiss cheese, or sliced fresh buffalo Mozzarella Large tomatoes, cut into thick slices

Red onion, thinly sliced

Olive oil or cooking spray

If using frozen 'grilled' chicken patties, cook them in the microwave or oven according to package directions.

Spread the bottom and top of your bread loaf or brioche rolls with the pesto sauce. Top with either deli turkey or your cooked chicken patties, then add tomato slice, thin sliced red onion, then top with either Swiss cheese or slices of the fresh buffalo Mozzarella. Top with the other half of the bread loaf or roll.

Lightly brush olive oil over the bread, or lightly coat with cooking spray. Place the sammies on a grill pan and heat over medium low heat – pressing down on the sammies, until the bread is crisp and the cheese is melted.

Select Board Review December 27, 2022

Bright Spot Solar out of Rochester gave the board a project proposal for town owned property on Dowboro Rd. The plan sounded like a good one, with a long term income stream that would go toward the general fund and help with taxes. Their written agreement will be reviewed by town counsel.

A request to replace a property survey pin that was in a sidewalk that was replaced four years ago on Chestnut St. was approved, up to \$200, by surveyor Henry Amsden.

The 2023 Town Meeting Warrant was reviewed and approved by the board. The sewer user fee warrant was also approved and bills have gone out.

The Trustees of the Library came to us for guidance relative to the on-going water issue in their basement. After the big storm before Christmas the cellar was inundated with water once again, this time prompting a call to Servpro to mitigate the damage. The board agreed that the Trustees needed some hands-on assistance and a board work session was scheduled for Dec. 29 at the library.

Police Chief Collins came to us asking that some unspent budget funds be encumbered for use in 2023 to make upgrades that are on the horizon as a requirement by the state or justifiable upgrades to the department. Among the encumbered funds, use will be an on-line fingerprint machine that will take the place of rolling your finger in ink. Background checks presently take weeks to get back and often times people who turn out to be wanted by law enforcement are long gone by the time that happens. This new machine will tie us directly into the nationwide system and speed background checks dramatically, plus we have the funds on hand to get it done without any further tax impact. Also on the upgrade list is required security for the PD evidence room, 'red-dot' scopes and department pistols, and laminate flooring to go over the ancient but unsalvageable wood floor in the PD. Necessary upgrades and maintenance to this old building allows us to operate our PD without need for a new building. *Carl Anderson*

While I am serving on these important committees, you can expect this column to focus on all of the important issues in the State House. I will do my best to summarize the issues every time I write and, in particular, how they will impact you in Senate District 17.


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
