#### "In a December 1933 letter to Ruth May Staniels"

Your splendid letter came, dear, And I'm mighty glad to hear That things are going better, And you all have good cheer.

It's hard to have good cheer of course When things are going wrong,

But I suppose we have to have those things
To make us strong.

Without them we would grow so

weak
We'd hardly know a thing.
It sometimes takes real trouble
To develop anything.

Just take for instance, Birches that grow with lots of space-

They send out branches everywhere

To scratch a fella's face.

But those that grow together With hardly room to see The Sun above, keep struggling, And make a worthwhile tree.

Their whole life's effort Isn't spent on froth and limbs and frill-

Their one ambition seems to be To grow yet higher still.

However for each birch That grows fullest height, Three others in that crowded space Get choked and then lose sight

Of all the sun's rays shining, And death's their final fee. I've often laid and wondered Which kind of birch I'd be!

Clifton, ten years older than Ruth, wrote this poem when she was a senior at Concord High School. In a previous letter, she had also insisted he write a jingle for her. He obliged and towards the end of this letter he penned,

"If, after this, you ever ask to have me write a jingle, I'll promptly turn you 'tummy down' and then apply a shingle."

Married during the flood of 1936, Clifton was on active duty in the National Guard and went AWOL to get married. This made headline news in national newspapers. Due to the 'National News' his C.O. didn't push the AWOL issue.

Ruth made headlines in the Suncook Valley Sun while an office manager at Universal Label in Pittsfield. She was on her way back from the bank with the cash payroll, when two males jumped into her car on each side of her and forced her to the middle. They demanded the money and she told them she had already paid everyone. Her skirt was actually covering the money in the bag on the floor. They drove down around Clark Street and she was able to talk them out of the car.

They both had a strong Christian faith, which was evident in their care of other people. Feeling that God had provided them with their home, they opened it up to those in need and to eight foster children. It was not uncommon to have 25 or more people at Thanksgiving Dinner. *Jean Cram*



#### **Henry F. Gray**

Henry F. Gray, 88, known as "Bumpa" to many, died from COVID-19 complications on December 16, 2020. He was born in Barnstead Parade (the building next to the Post Office, as he would tell us) on September 17, 1932. the youngest child of Edward and Ada Gray. He was a 1950 graduate of Pittsfield High School. Henry served in the US Army during the Korean conflict and was a lifelong member of American Legion Post #75 in Pittsfield. In 1951, he married his high school sweetheart and the love of his life, Shirley Frenette, and was married to her for the next 68 years. The couple resided in Pittsfield, and together owned and operated Gray's Department Store. Henry was elected and served a term as Pittsfield's Tax Collector in the 1970's. He was a communicant of Our Lady of Lourdes Church in Pittsfield. Henry and Shirley later moved to Kings Towne Park in Epsom, where they spent their retirement years. In 2018, they moved to the John H. Whitaker Place Assisted Living facility in Penacook. Henry transitioned to Pleasant View Center in Concord after Shirley's death in November, 2019.



Henry was an avid hunter, candlepin bowler, and enjoyed playing horseshoes and watching the Red Sox. He was a curious man who loved to question why; he loved to dance and sing and be silly, and make others laugh whenever he could. Henry was a loving father, grandfather, and great-grandfather, and will be deeply missed. His light has gone out, but his memory will shine forever in our hearts.

#### **Cook's Corner Nachos**



I recognize that Santa will be here in a few days and you were probably expecting to see a recipe for a traditional holiday dish. But how are we feeling about nachos? It's time to lighten up, take a break from the seasonal madness (and the weather) and put out a stunning party platter of deliciousness that everyone will love! Please accept my very best wishes to you and your loved

ones for a wonderful holiday.

1 to 1& ½ lbs ground beef

14 cup sliced green onions, or yellow onions

1 cup taco sauce

14 tsp garlic powder

¼ tsp cumin

Fresh ground pepper

1 (15 oz) can kidney or black beans, drained

Guacamole (optional)

8 oz frozen corn, thawed

3 cups shredded iceberg lettuce

1 cup chopped tomato

1 to 1 ½ cup shredded cheddar cheese

Jalapeno slices (optional)

Salsa

Sour cream

1 bag of tortilla chips

Cook the meat and the onions in a large skillet. Drain well and return the mixture to the pan. Add taco sauce, garlic powder, cumin, a few grinds of black pepper, the beans and the corn. Stir to combine and cook until warmed through.

Place chips on a large platter. Top with the meat mixture, then lettuce, then tomatoes, then cheese. Plop salsa, sour cream, guacamole (if using) and jalapenos (if using) in strategic locations all around Mount Nacho.

Grab a fistful of extra napkins, ask your Sweetheart to grab you an ice cold adult beverage, throw some vintage Santana on your favorite music device and dig in! Since you only used 1 pan and 1 platter, it's completely acceptable that you would expect others to handle the clean-up. Leaving you more time for another adult beverage and more music.
