SLOW COOKER Raisin-Bread Pudding

busy and maybe even a little bit stressed getting ready for the holidays. Don't worry about that extra dessert. Here's an old school recipe that's quick and easy to put together, and a classic dish that is certain to bring smiles and memories. There's a reason our Grannies and Aunties made this traditional sweet. It's delicious! With your very first bite, you will be taken back to a happy time.

For the Pudding

8 slices bread, cubed 4 large eggs 2 cups milk ¼ cup sugar ¼ cup butter, melted ½ cup raisins ½ tsp ground cinnamon

For The Sauce

- 2 TBSP butter
- 2 TBSP flour
- 1 cup water
- ¾ cup sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

Place bread cubes in a greased slow cooker bowl. In a large bowl, beat eggs and milk; stir in sugar, melted butter, raisins and cinnamon.

Pour over the bread cubes and stir. Cover and cook on HIGH for 1 hour.

Reduce heat to LOW and cook for another 3 to 4 hours.

For the sauce, melt butter in a small saucepan.

Stir in the flour, until smooth.

Gradually add water, sugar and vanilla. Bring to a boil, cook and stir for 2 minutes or until sauce has thickened.

Serve the warm bread pudding with the warm sauce.

Select Board Review December 14, 2021

A public hearing was held regarding "unanticipated local fiscal recovery funds." A total of \$431,845 spread over two years, coming from the Feds, which we can apply to the massive wastewater overhaul that is looming in the near future, was accepted by the Board. It will make a pretty good dent in what promises to be a multi-million dollar project that the Town is required to address.

We discussed a potential temporary shortage of police coverage over the holidays due to covid exposures, new patrolmen still in training, and last-minute vacation requests before year's end. It's anticipated that our valued part-time officers will be able to take up the slack. The town is fortunate to have a PD that works hard to cover the town 24/7.

Numerous book-keeping and fund transfers were approved.
