Cook's Corner



Whew, it's hot out there! Beat the heat with these cool salads. They're easy to put together, no cooking required, just a little chopping. And if you want to serve either chicken or fish alongside either of these, cook your "main" on the grill so you're not heating up the kitchen. Enjoy!

Cucumber Salad with Sour Cream and Dill Dressing

½ cup sour cream or plain Greek yogurt

- 2 Tbsp lemon juice
- 2 Tbsp fresh dill, chopped, plus more for garnish Coarse salt & fresh ground pepper
- 1 lb of cucumbers, halved lengthwise then thinly sliced crosswise

In a medium bowl, combine sour cream, lemon juice and dill. Season with salt & pepper; whisk to combine. Add cucumbers; gently toss to coat. Garnish with more dill.

Serve this ice cold on a hot summer day with a piece of grilled salmon or crab cakes, a few thick slices of juicy tomatoes on the side, and your favorite summertime adult beverage. This is also very tasty as a sandwich filler with either sliced deli ham or turkey. These cukes only keep for a day or two, so eat up!

Orzo Salad with Spicy Buttermilk Dressing

1 cup uncooked orzo or other small shaped pasta

1 cup frozen corn kernels, thawed & drained

12 cherry tomatoes, quartered

3 green onions, sliced

1 (15 oz) can black beans, drained and rinsed

14 lowfat buttermilk

3 Tbsp lime juice

2 Tbsp light sour cream

2 Tbsp mayonnaise

1 tsp chili powder

½ tsp salt

¼ tsp ground black pepper

¼ tsp ground red pepper

2 garlic cloves, crushed

3 Tbsp chopped fresh cilantro

1 avocado, peeled, cut into 8 wedges

1 Tbsp fresh flat-leaf parsley, chopped

Cook the orzo or pasta per package directions. Drain and rinse. In a large bowl, toss the pasta with the corn, tomatoes, green onions and black beans.

Whisk together buttermilk and next 8 ingredients and 2 Tbsp of cilantro, in a small bowl. Drizzle the dressing over the pasta mixture. Top with avocado slices, parsley and remaining cilantro.

This salad is easy to double and it's great for a potluck. We like to serve this cold with either grilled chicken or beer-steamed shrimp.

To my constituents in Pittsfield,

This week, the House met again at UNH's hockey stadium, in the last scheduled session of the year. We will meet once more for the vetoes – there's one already and I expect more from this session.

We had to vote on House bills amended by the Senate, and all but two were omnibus bills collecting a large number of Senate bills, usually on somewhat related topics. Many representatives, including myself, were concerned that the usual process had been vastly shortchanged and that public input into these bills had not met our standards of transparency. Because of that, and because nearly all the omnibus bills had at least one unacceptable section, I voted against all of them. One, HB 1491, had come from my committee, and my chair made the only motion to not accept Senate amendments, citing the bulk of the amendment and the lack of time to analyze it properly!

The two single element bills were HB 685, an insurance mandate that abortion be considered a maternity benefit, and HB 731, an increase in the state minimum wage. Both passed (196-132 and 199-124) on a party line basis and are expected to be vetoed.



Jeannette could hear the ticking of the mantel clock behind her while Mrs. Clough closed her eyes.


"But Paul was a kind and humble man," Mrs. Clough continued. Jeannette saw a spark in the elder's eyes, the gold coming to life around their edges.
