Cook's Corner Stuffed Shells – Meatballs Make it Easy



Now here's a super easy, crowd-pleasing dish we can all get behind! You can double this if you're cooking for a large group and bake the shells in a big disposable aluminum pan for quick clean-up. All you need to round out this meal is a salad, garlic bread and maybe some extra grated Parmesan. Mangia!

1 box of jumbo pasta shells

Meatballs, homemade or frozen store-bought

1 large jar of Marinara sauce, plus more if you like it saucy

- 8 oz Ricotta cheese
- 1 egg
- 2 cups shredded Mozzarella cheese
- 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese, grated
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- 1 tsp dried basil

** optional, you can add a little crushed red pepper or cayenne to the sauce

OMG this is so easy. Cook the jumbo shells per package directions and drain.

Heat the oven to 350.

In a bowl, whip the Ricotta with the egg, add basil and oregano and salt & pepper.

In a glass baking dish, put down a layer of Marinara sauce, several large spoonfuls, reserve the rest for the top.

Fill each cooked shell with a plop of Ricotta and a meatball. Place the filled shells in the baking dish. Top the entire thing with the rest of the Marinara, sprinkle with a little more basil and oregano, then throw some shredded Mozzarella and Parmesan over the whole pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven for about 30 minutes, until hot & bubbly.

Cut a salad, heat the garlic bread, and ring the dinner bell! *MP Christakos*
