The Pittsfield Players will stage the One Act play, Trifles, written by Susan Glaspell and first performed in 1916 in Providence, Massachusetts. Directed by Meggin Dail and sponsored by The Iron Dragon Corporation, *Trifles* promises to surprise you with a bit of mystery and give you a little something to think about.

The play begins as the men, followed by the women, enter the Wrights' empty farm house. On command from the county attorney, Mr. Hale recounts his visit to the house the previous day, when he found Mrs. Wright behaving strangely and her husband upstairs with a rope around his neck, dead.

Jeannie LeGrow, recently "seen" as the Ghost of Christmas Yet To Come in Scrooge The Musical, plays Mrs. Hale, Farmer Hale's wife and the Wright's next door neighbor. Coy McCarty, recently seen as Bob Cratchitt in Scrooge The Musical and Billy Bibbit in Cuckoo's Nest, plays Mr. Hale. Mrs. Peters, the Sheriff's wife, is played by Tyler Fish who is a wonderful new addition to The Pittsfield Players Sheriff Peters, portrayed by Kiefer Archambault, also of Cuckoo's Nest fame as Mr. Scanlon. Jeff Gregoire, experienced vet of The Pittsfield Players with too many talents to count, plays the County Attorney.

Jeannie, and the rest, do a fantastic job of bringing this small town murder mystery to life in Trifles. Coming to The Scenic Theatre, Home of The Pittsfield Players, 6 Depot Street, February 28 & 29 and March 6 & 7 at 7:30pm and March 1 at 2pm.

## **Select-Board Meeting February 18, 2020**

The State requested that we accept their "Permissible Fireworks" list, or impose additional restrictions of our own. We voted to accept the State's list. Hours of use are described as "reasonable" by the Police Department. Generally, ending at 10pm on weeknights and 11pm on weekends.

Memorial Day will be here before we know it and a revival, of the commemoration it deserves, will get underway at an organizational meeting March 3, at 6pm at the Town Hall. There's a lot to plan and we need to get started. Veterans and active military are particularly solicited to take part in the parade.

A citizen generously offered to create an "unofficial" town Facebook (FB) page. After consideration we decided to decline. The Board doesn't encourage the use of FB due to the gossip and misinformation so prevalent there. Our meetings are open to the public and the Board welcomes any citizen concerned enough to make a judgement to join us, ask questions, and express concerns, face to face. The town website is available to check on any upcoming municipal events. Carl Anderson

## To my constituents in Pittsfield,

This week, my committee recommended 13 bills to the full House. I worked extensively on the most important, HB 1642, which bans the State from engaging in facial recognition technology and protects the Department of Motor Vehicle's database of pictures from being used for such a search. The opposition in committee was concerned about taking a tool away from law enforcement. The rest of us agreed that the technology was flawed but had the potential to create a police state if it were reliable. We voted, 18-2, to protect everyone's privacy.

We also met in session with a rather short calendar. HB 1649, increasing car registration fees on more fuel efficient vehicles, (to make up for the gas taxes they don't pay), was not tabled. It was debated at length, then did not pass, 144-173. The opposition was mixed between those opposed to the fees, those who wanted to support electric and high-mileage cars, and those concerned about the fairness of this particular fee. Representative Allard

voted for it, I voted against, and Representative Klose was excused from the session.

We did pass HB 1605, requiring children under 2 to be restrained in a rear-facing child seat. It was not tabled. It was debated, with opponents pointing out that the bill required violating federal safety standards and manufacturer's recommendations. It still passed, 182-128.



## Cook's Corner Crispy Oven Fried Chicken Two Ways!

We hope you enjoyed our first Cook's Corner. Here's another recipe we think you'll like.

Corn flake cereal, crushed to make at least 2 cups 2 cups Egg Whites (from a carton, where they sell eggs)

2 to 3 Tbsp Ranch dressing

1 tsp paprika

1 tsp salt

1 tsp garlic powder

1/4 tsp ground red pepper (or 1/2 tsp if desired)
3 to 4 lbs chicken thighs, legs, breasts – bone in, remove the skin

Heat oven to 400°F. Spray tin foil covered baking sheet with cooking spray.

Place crushed corn flakes in one bowl. In another bowl, combine egg white, Ranch dressing (the secret ingredient, don't tell anyone) and spices through red pepper and whisk until combined.

Dip chicken pieces in egg white, then coat them in the corn flakes, place on the baking sheet. Once you're done, if you have leftover corn flakes, put them on the tops of the chicken pieces.

Spray all of the chicken lightly with cooking spray and bake for 45 minutes or until chicken is tender and juices run clear.

#### VARIATION:

Follow the same directions, but replace the bone-in chicken with chicken tenders. If using tenders, you may only need to cook them for 30 minutes versus 45 minutes. You'll have to check.


This chicken is a classic, much healthier than deep fried chicken but just as crunchy and tasty. It's great cold and reheats well in the micro or regular oven.


