**Happy Birthday** wishes to everyone who has a birthday this week. Can you believe I do not have anyone on my calendar!

#### To my constituents in Pittsfield,

This week, the House met for three long days to meet our deadline for acting on House bills not in a second committee. As usual, we killed more (usually bad) bills than we passed (hopefully good) ones; since we were on a deadline, many bills were tabled to avoid debate. After this week, they would need a 2/3 vote for any action, so it's much the same result.

After extensive debate, we passed HB 1476, a revision to the bail laws to require offenders who were already out on bail to see a judge before release. It passed 199-134; from the debate I gathered a lot of the issues would be resolved if a judge were available 24/7.

We passed HB 1639, making the youth risk behavior survey opt-in, like all other non-academic surveys, rather than opt-out. From my committee, we passed, 187-148, the amendment to HB 1135, moving the performance audit of the education freedom account program out a year so that we would have a full year of data to audit. We also passed HB 1171, exempting some specialty beauty services from licensure, 201-147, and HB 1330, which as amended repealed the registration requirement for medical technicians, 175-168.

HB 1677, appropriating \$100 million to settle claims for abuse at the Sununu Youth Center, was debated and passed on a voice vote. An amendment to add emotional abuse to the settlement scope, and triple the per-person limit, was debated and killed, 164-177.

#### Fun in the Sun

The Pittsfield Parks and Recreation Commission will be looking for lifeguards this summer. To receive lifeguard certification, you must be 15 years old, but to be a lifeguard for the Town of Pittsfield you must be 16. The town reimburses 75% of the cost of your training if you work for us for two summers. Swim New Hampshire and the YMCA both offer courses. If you are looking for fun outside, summer job, are a strong swimmer, and enjoy working with children and adults, you might want to find a lifeguard training course and watch for the job posting coming soon in the *Pittsfield Post*.

#### **Game-changer Part Two**

This is the 2nd installment for using the game-changer method for a favorite card game. This time it's for a solitaire game.

Standard solitaire is a popular card game for a single player using one 52-card pack. Liz Dimmick invented her own version to share with us by using the game-changer method.

Before explaining the rules, let's define the different piles of cards:

- 1. TABLEAU the seven piles that make up the main table
- 2. FOUNDATIONS the four piles above the tableau built of whole suits in sequence
- 3. STOCK / HAND the pile remaining from which additional cards are brought into play according to the rules
- 4. TALON / WASTE cards from stock pile that can't be played on the tableau or foundation and are laid face-up in its own pile

Setting up the piles of cards is done exactly the same way as standard solitaire, but what's different is the sequencing on the tableau and foundation piles.

Instead of starting foundation piles with "Aces" and building upwards to "Kings", you will do exactly the opposite. You start the foundation pile with "Kings" and work your way down to "Aces".

Instead of starting new tableau piles with "Kings" and building downwards to "Aces", you will do exactly the opposite. Start new tableau piles with "Aces" and build upwards to "Kings".

Once you get the 'hang of it', you may enjoy playing this new way! Jean Cram

# Cooks Corner Maple Cupcakes & Frosting

For our fourth installment in the 'Maple Month' series, we feature two classics, both sent to us by our devoted reader and friend, *Corine Miller*. First we have *Maple Shortbread Cookies* which are simple to make and so delicious with your favorite cup of coffee or tea. These cookies will keep well in an airtight container. Next we have *Maple Cupcakes and Maple Frosting*. Tell the kiddos if they eat their dinner, they'll have a special treat for dessert! Don't forget to stop by Journey's End Maple Farm to get all of your maple supplies. Enjoy!

Pour the batter into cupcake papers or into a lightly greased muffin pan.

# Maple Cupcakes and Maple Frosting For the cupcakes

½ cup butter
½ cup maple sugar
1 cup maple syrup
2 eggs
1 tsp maple extract
2 & ½ cups flour
2 tsp baking powder
½ tsp ground ginger
1 tsp baking soda
¼ tsp salt
1 cup hot water



Heat oven to 350. Cream together butter, maple sugar, maple syrup, eggs and maple extract. In a large bowl, mix flour, baking powder, ginger, baking soda and salt. Add the creamed mixture to the dry ingredients and mix well. Then add 1 cup hot water. Bake for 30 to 35 minutes. After they've cooled, top with the maple frosting.

#### For the maple frosting

4 cups confectioner's sugar ½ cup butter, softened 3 TBSP milk ¼ cup maple syrup ½ tsp maple extract

Combine all ingredients and beat with a hand-mixer on high until smooth. Frost the cupcakes then sprinkle a little maple sugar across the tops.

#### Maple Shortbread

2 sticks butter ¼ cup maple syrup 1/3 cup brown sugar 1 tsp maple extract 2 & ½ cups flour Maple sugar

Heat oven to 300.

Cream together first 4 ingredients until light and fluffy. Add flour and mix well.

Roll dough out on a lightly floured board to about ¼ inch thick. Using small cookie cutters, cut out and place the cookies on an ungreased baking sheet. Use a small fork to make light dents in the dough. Sprinkle the tops with maple sugar.

Bake for 15 minutes. This recipe makes about 50 small cookies.


#### Pittsfield in the News


