



# Cook's Corner Carrot Ginger Soup

I know we're all looking ahead to the warm weather that Summer will bring, but it can still be a little brisk in Spring. The other day, the temps dropped a bit and I searched through my files for a nice Spring soup and found this old favorite. It's very easy to make, so flavorful and a beautiful color – pleasing to all of our senses. I've made this many times. Once I didn't have ginger so I substituted curry powder and it was great. I like to serve this soup with a good salad; or for a heartier meal, grill up a few Turkey Ruben sammies. Yum-O! Have fun in the kitchen!

2 TBSP olive oil

½ cup chopped onion

4 cups chopped carrots (1/2 inch pieces)

4 cups vegetable broth (or chicken broth)

1 cup orange juice

1 TBSP + 2 tsp fresh ginger, minced (or buy a tube of fresh ginger, produce aisle)

1 TBSP lemon juice

1 (14 oz) can coconut milk

½ tsp salt

Fresh ground black pepper to taste

Heat olive oil in a large saucepan, add onion, saute until translucent, about 5 minutes.

Add carrots, broth, orange juice, ginger, lemon juice and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 20 minutes, or until carrots are tender. Let this cool, then working in batches, puree the soup in the blender until smooth.

Return mixture to the saucepan, stir in coconut milk and season with salt & pepper to taste.

### To my constituents in Pittsfield,

This week, my committee finished its Senate bills. We heard the last two, SB 224 on children's environmental health day, and SB 450, on the prescription drug affordability board. We also heard an amendment to SB 224 that would change the criteria for licensing out-of-state plumbers; I liked the idea but after learning the constituent who triggered this amendment had never applied for a New Hampshire license, was more ready to listen to the opposition. SB 224 was voted to be killed, and we sent SB 450 to interim study with the other bill we have on the drug affordability board.

Most of our other bills were amended in accordance with the subcommittee recommendations and passed. SB 397, two interstate compacts, had the compact on placement of children deleted, because some of us had reservations about it, and there was no urgency as that compact won't come into effect any time soon. SB 274, prohibiting project labor agreements, was recommended to be killed, 12-7.

The redistricting committee met on SB 200, which is now the congressional district map. The minority presented their previous map (current districts with Hampton switched from CD1 to CD2.) This was criticized as splitting economic communities and counties, and even as not being the "least changed" as they could have moved a few towns in the North Country and result in a lesser deviation between the districts. It failed, 7-8. The Republican mapmaker presented a new map, concentrating CD1 in the I93 corridor, which had several advantages: population deviation of 5 people, only two counties split, and all economic communities kept together (except ones already split by county lines.) The political competitiveness was excellent, as in 2020 the Republican would have won by 50.5%. Can't get much tighter than that! The Democrats criticized it as moving too many communities from one district to another, and not being "competitive." After some discussion, this map passed, 8-7 (all votes in this committee are on party lines.)

### **School Board Update**

The School Board received the Site Council's amended dress code proposal for first reading. The Board will consider and discuss the proposal at our next meeting. Thank you, as always, to our student representative, Matthew Swenson, for his commitment to his school community.

Ms. Bickford encouraged the Board to support a friend of the court brief in the *Verrill v. NH DHHS* case. The appeal of this case has the potential for a significant impact on our many students identified with disabilities and their families. The Board agreed to contribute \$1,000 in legal fees as a show of support.

Mr. Lane shared about the events of April 13 with the fire in town. He expressed gratitude to the school staff for their support of the children during this frightening experience. Board member Sandi Adams commended PES nurse Amber Goodwin for her bravery and commitment to Pittsfield by reading the commendation awarded to her by the Select Board. The Board is so very proud of Ms. Goodwin and thankful for her efforts.

The candidates for the vacant board seats have been interviewed and the Board felt as though both candidates did an excellent job. We have asked the candidates to answer some follow up questions so the Board will have the information we need to make the best decision for the seat.
