Select Board Review November 28, 2023

Two public hearings were held, the first to consider acceptance of unanticipated revenue over \$10,000. This was to accept a relatively small contribution from the State toward the highway fund. We gladly accepted what we could get, without comment from the public. The second was the final hearing to consider implementing Community Power for the town. One resident spoke in favor, none opposed. We voted to place the question on the Town Warrant for a vote in March.

Numerous voter approved housekeeping funds transfers were made.

Highway Dept. employee Scott Jackson's annual review was approved with a merit increase in pay.

Fire Chief Pszonowsky signed a new three-year contract. Pete wears many other town hats including EMS and Health Officer, assists the building inspector and highway dept., and follows our requests efficiently and without complaint. He and Dep. Chief Freese are constantly looking to save taxpayer's costs wherever possible, and we're lucky to have them.


The following letter has been sent to lifelong residents Marl and Andi Riel, which the Board would like to share with the public;


Dear Mark and Andi,

Cook's Corner Coq au Champagne

Here's an elegant and easy dish you might want to try. Coq au Champagne (French for Chicken with Champagne) is a lighter riff on the classic typically made with red wine. I normally use Prosecco, such as La Marca, which is reasonably priced; but any sparkling wine will do. Also, instead of bone-in chicken breast, I typically do bone-in chicken thigh and a few drumsticks. Serve with boiled or mashed potatoes, or egg noodles. Add a nice green salad alongside and heat up some French baguette to soak up the luscious sauce. Bon appetit!! MP Christakos

2 TBSP olive oil

4 bone-in chicken breasts, or 6 to 8 small chicken thighs, and/or chicken drumsticks – **skin on**

2 stalks celery, finely chopped

2 large shallots, thinly sliced

 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb pearl onions, peeled (or $\frac{1}{2}$ bag of frozen pearl onions, thawed)

2 carrots, roughly chopped

1 lb mushrooms, halved if large

2 sprigs fresh thyme

12 oz Champagne or any sparkling wine

½ to ¾ cup chicken stock

2 sprigs fresh tarragon, chop the leaves (or 1 tsp dried tarragon)

3 TBSP crème fraiche (or heavy cream)

Lemon wedges for serving

Heat 1 TBSP oil in a lidded skillet or Dutch oven. Fry chicken skin-side down. Season the top of chicken with salt & pepper and cook until the skin side is crisp & golden. Turn over, season skin side with salt & pepper and cook for another 5 minutes. Remove chicken from pan to a platter and keep warm.

Add remaining 1 TBSP oil to the pan along with celery, shallots, pearl onions and carrots. Cook on low for 8 to 10 minutes until vegetables are softened. Turn up the heat a little, add the mushrooms and thyme and cook for another 5 to 10 minutes.

Pour champagne or wine in and allow alcohol to cook off a little. Then add the chicken broth, start with ½ cup. Bring to a boil, nestle the chicken back into the pan and cook, <u>covered</u>, for 10 minutes. Remove the lid and cook for an additional 10 minutes, adding more broth if the sauce gets too thick. Remove from heat. Stir in tarragon leaves and cream.

Several boarding houses were erected for the flow of mill workers who came to town for jobs in the many mills that were built and thriving. And there were at least two summer camps, on Lily Pond and White's Pond.
