Josiah Carpenter Library Reopens

The library is open by appointment and to drop in. No more than four people are allowed to enter the building at once: one person to use a computer, one to send a fax, and two to borrow materials. You may also request materials and pick them up outside. If you're eager to read a current bestseller, please be patient because all returned items will be quarantined for 48 hours.

Library employees were working while the building was closed. When you saw us going in and out, were you curious what we were up to? Well first, along with the rest of the world, we did some cleaning (it took many dishwasher loads to wash the Legos). Then we started to make a big mess. Closets were emptied and sorted; one of the closets, the bathroom and downstairs hallway were painted. There was a cast iron pipe that was near the end of its life span. A portion of the downstairs ceiling was cut and then repaired after a new pipe was installed. The most complex project, reorganization of the children's non-fiction books, is ongoing. Why is a book about the discovery of new dinosaur remains on a different shelf than dinosaur books? Why are books about extinct animals separate from animal books? To solve the problem, we've created a custom Josiah Carpenter Dewey Decimal system. (Dinosaurs are now shelved next to reptiles.) So if you see some shelves with books that cannot be borrowed they will be available as soon as we finish adjusting their catalog records..

Cook's Corner Roasted Salmon with White Wine Sauce

After weeks of quarantine and perhaps indulging in comfort foods to soothe our souls, I decided to feature a healthy dinner option. Although fresh salmon is always preferred, this works just as well with frozen salmon or cod; and once you master the art of the simple white wine sauce – it's also great on pan-sautéed chicken cutlets.

1½ lbs. salmon filet
Coarse salt
Pepper
1 Tbsp. butter
2 tsp. flour
1 cup dry white wine
1 Tbsp. fresh, chopped chives


Heat oven to 450F. Place salmon on a foil-lined rimmed baking sheet; season with salt & pepper. Roast until opaque throughout, about 15 to 20 minutes.

Meanwhile in a saucepan, melt the butter. Add flour and cook, whisking constantly for about 1 minute. Add the wine, stir and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for about 8 minutes. Stir in the chives and more salt & pepper to taste.

Serve the sauce over the salmon. My go-to sides for this dish are boiled red new potatoes and steamed veggies. Add some lemon slices, sprinkle each plate overall with fresh chopped parsley, and voila! An elegant and super healthy dinner. MP Christakos




