Cooks' Corner Three Cheese Pasta Bake

1 16-oz package ziti or penne pasta
2 (10 oz) containers refrigerated Alfredo sauce
1 (8 oz) container sour cream
1 (15 oz) container ricotta cheese
2 large eggs, lightly beaten
¼ cup fresh grated Parmesan cheese
¼ cup fresh chopped parsley
1½ cups shredded Mozzarella cheese

Heat oven to 350F. Prepare ziti or penne according to package directions. Drain and return to pot. Stir together Alfredo sauce and sour cream, toss with the pasta and stir until pasta is evenly coated. Spoon half of the pasta mixture into a lightly greased 13 x 9 inch baking dish. Stir together Ricotta cheese and the next 3 ingredients. Spread evenly over the pasta mixture in the baking dish. Spoon remaining pasta mixture evenly over the top. Sprinkle with shredded Mozzarella. Bake for 30 minutes. This is such an easy dish, and it's great for a potluck since it goes with just about everything. It can be the main event for a vegetarian night with a big salad, or it's also a wonderful side for grilled or baked chicken, pork tenderloin, or steaks.

May 1 - Time to license your dog(s).

Dogs must be licensed each year by May 1st, per State Law RSA 466:1

Fees:

\$9.00 for unaltered dogs;

\$6.50 for neutered/spayed dogs;

\$2.00 for 1st dog with an owner over 65;

\$20.00 for group license of five or more dogs.

There are three ways to license your dog(s). For all cases, we need a record of the current rabies vaccination.

- U.S. mail.

Select Board Meeting April 14, 2020

The Board of Selectmen continues to meet regularly in order to conduct the affairs of the town, despite having to take extra precautions. Keeping a safe distance from everyone is now standard, and the town hall staff goes to great lengths to sterilize the room before and after meetings. So far attendance has been very limited, and we have been able to keep the room to the ordered limit of ten. If we have more. we'll have to adjourn and conduct the meeting remotely.

We considered a dispute over paving charges associated with the "safe routes to school" sidewalk and road job, for which we had obtained a 100% grant from the state. The overage of about \$15,000 is not covered by the grant ,and the board voted to pay what we believe is an honest debt. We will pursue being compensated by the state for this charge, otherwise it will come from our budgeted road improvements.

Also, we are looking into the advisability of continuing with the town-wide reassessment, which by law is due to take place this year. The Board is concerned that the housing market during the pandemic will result in faulty data to base comparable sales values on. Our assessor, Avitar, doesn't share that concern. We'll see where this goes as we investigate our options, if we have any. It is important that new assessments reflect values accurately.


We optimistically approved a parade permit for Old Home Day in July. Plans for an expanded Memorial Day remembrance on May 30 are in a holding pattern right now. We're taking these things a day at a time. A grant application request from Emergency Management Director Rob Freese was approved for funds to pay for a mobilization trailer. This much-needed piece of equipment will allow fast response to any occurrence necessary. This pandemic business is shedding new light on towns being prepared for whatever comes down the road.
