History of Glass Making in New Hampshire

As a boy, he would search dumps and landfills looking for medicine bottles. Over the years, his expertise of bottles expanded into historical flasks and Early American glassware. Also, he has extensively researched the production of 18th and 19th century glasshouses throughout New England.

Learn About our local Free Seed Library!

As New Englanders, we look forward to the change of seasons, especially a warm, bright spring after the cold, snowy winter. In preparation, Josiah Carpenter Library has lined up a variety of Spring Fun! A free seed library has been added, a garden book display was organized and a variety of speakers and events have been set.

On Thursday, April 20 Nikki Seavey from Blueberry Ridge Blooms & Farmstead here in Pittsfield joined about 20 townsfolk at the library to teach them about growing flowers in our area. She shared her love of dahlias with us and also encouraged folks to take home a variety of different seeds to start for their own home gardens. We are looking forward to a tour of her gorgeous gardens on Sunday, July 23rd at 10am.

On Saturday, April 22 over 15 patrons planted and/or swapped over 50 varieties of different seeds and borrowed a variety of garden books during our "Seed and Read" event. A special thank you to Brooke Weldon for her donations and expertise for this event.

The Seed library is an ongoing project at the library where folks can take seeds to plant at home to grow their own veggies, flowers and herbs. Over the next few weeks, pots and soil will be available for patrons to start their own seeds and bring them home for their own gardens.

We hope folks will continue to help our seed library grow by saving seeds this fall and lend some back to the library for community members to plant next year. We also encourage anyone who has more seedlings than they need to bring them in for our "Seedling Swap"- a designated shelf at the library to give an opportunity to donate or swap seedlings of different varieties. Later this summer and fall, we urge folks to take part in our "Harvest Swap", where they can bring extra garden grown items into the library to donate/swap with others. The library will provide a big community basket where everyone can share their bountiful harvests!

As a reminder, we have a new Library of Things collection where patrons may borrow a bulb planter, edger tool, loppers, pole saw, and more! *Melissa Babcock*

Cook's Corner Chicken Cacciatore

thousand recipes for Chicken
Cacciatore, but this is the one I've been

making since I first learned to cook. A few tips – you can remove the skin from the chicken pieces or not (it's healthier); you don't have to dredge the chicken in flour, if you remove the skin, you might want to. Using fresh rosemary sprigs is better than dried. Also, if you feel your sauce needs to be saucier, add ¾ cup of either white wine or red wine (I prefer red). You will definitely want to add fresh, chopped basil for serving. This classic, one-pot dish, is great with a side of cooked pasta, although I typically just put out hot, crusty rolls (to soak up the sauce) and a simple green salad dressed with vinaigrette. Enjoy!

2 TBSP olive oil

5 lbs chicken pieces, bone-in, such as legs and thighs ½ cup flour

1 large onion, cut vertically into ¼ inch wedges

8 oz mushrooms, cut in half

4 cloves garlic, sliced or minced

3 sprigs fresh rosemary or 1 tsp dried rosemary

1 tsp dried oregano

1 tsp dried basil

½ tsp crushed red pepper flakes

1 cup tomato sauce

1 cup crushed tomatoes

½ cup chicken or beef broth

1 tsp salt

½ tsp ground black pepper

2 red bell peppers, sliced fairly thin

2 green bell peppers, sliced fairly thin

Fresh basil leaves, chopped, for serving

Heat oven to 350. Dredge chicken pieces in the flour. Heat oil in a Dutch oven, over high heat. Working in batches, brown the chicken, 3 to 4 minutes per side. Transfer chicken to a platter and keep warm. Reduce heat to medium, add onion, mushrooms and garlic, cook until tender, about 5 to 7 minutes. Add more oil if necessary. Stir in rosemary, oregano, basil, crushed red pepper, tomato sauce, crushed tomatoes, broth, salt & pepper. Stir and bring to a gentle boil. Return chicken to the pot, along with any juices. Top chicken with the bell peppers. Transfer to the oven and bake, covered, for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Skim off fat from the sauce before serving. Mangia! *MP Christakos*

What is an SLC?

PMHS students conduct Student Led Conferences (SLCs) twice each school year, in November and April. As part of our emphasis on student-centered learning, PMHS expects students to take a lead role in discussions that articulate their academic, personal, and social growth.

Through SLCs students learn to:

- Organize and run a meeting
- Discuss their goals with trusted adults in their lives
- Develop their post-secondary (after high school) plans
- Connect their school experience to their post-secondary plans and to the Pittsfield Vision of Learner
- Self-assess their progress in school and toward their goals
- Improve their understanding of how they learn, and become a better self-advocate for their own learning
- Celebrate their accomplishments

SLCs are also an opportunity for families to clarify understanding about school programs and procedures. Families are always welcome to schedule a more traditional parent-teacher conference meeting with a teacher outside of the SLC windows to discuss specific course concerns or questions. *Kiza Armour, PMHS*
