Cook's Corner

Sesame Beef & Broccoli Stir Fry

I know you're always looking for dinners that are quick and easy to get to the table, and while this ingredient list looks long, this one-pot meal comes together fast. Although this calls for steak, I've also made this with pork tenderloin and with boneless chicken breast (sliced thin or use chicken tenders). I normally double the

thin, or use chicken tenders). I normally double the sauce ingredients; and we use brown rice, although you can also serve this over cooked ramen or other noodles. Bon appetit!

- 2 TBSP soy sauce
- 2 TBSP cooking sherry
- 1 TBSP sugar
- 2 tsp rice vinegar (cider vinegar will do in a pinch)
- 1/2 tsp red pepper flakes
- 1/2 tsp cornstarch
- 1 TBSP plus 1 tsp vegetable oil
- 1 lb boneless New York strip steak, thinly sliced
- 1 small red onion, sliced thin vertically

1 box Shitake mushrooms, sliced (or cremini mushrooms)

- 2 red bell peppers, thinly sliced vertically
- 1 cup fresh broccoli florets
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 TBSP toasted sesame seeds
- Cooked rice for serving

Thin sliced scallions for serving (optional)

In a small bowl, combine soy sauce, sherry, sugar, vinegar, red pepper flakes and cornstarch. If you prefer more sauce, double the amounts for these ingredients.

In a large skillet, heat 1 TBSP vegetable oil and in two batches, cook the steak, about 2 to 3 minutes. Transfer to a plate and keep warm. Add 1 tsp more of the oil to the skillet and add the onion, cook for 2 to 3 minutes over medium heat. Add the garlic, cook for 1 minute. Add the bell peppers and cook for 1 minute. Add the Shitake mushrooms, cook for 1 to 2 minutes. Add the broccoli and cook for another 2 minutes. Whisk the soy sauce mixture into the skillet, then add the steak back in (including any accumulated juices). Cook for 1 to 2 minutes so everything is heated through.

Serve with rice, topped with a few sprinkles of sesame seeds and the chopped scallions. *MP Christakos*

Politics from the Gallery

To the readers of the *Pittsfield Post*, and those outlying towns: We've heard from our Reps several times now on what's going on in the State House. Clayton and Cyril have been VERY busy earning their \$100! I've also been attending a few hearings and testifying at some, so I thought sharing via the *Post* would encourage others to do the same.

One of the great things about NH is the ability for regular people to go and share their views at the "House." You don't have to get elected in order to make a difference! My advice is when you speak at a hearing, keep it to less than 3 minutes. Listen to what others have said before you so you don't make the same points. No one there wants to waste time, so don't be guilty. You can access the "calendar" of the week's hearings by going to https://www.claytoncyril4house.com and find the link for the House Calendar. We're so lucky we don't have to travel 2 hours to be heard.

This week I testified to the Criminal Justice Committee against the Red Flag Gun bill, HB 106-FN. I've witnessed how it is used by the actual lawbreaker to achieve their own satisfaction. This is a gross miscarriage of justice. I spoke at the Education Committee in favor of HB 539-FN. There have been circumstances where children have been administered vaccines at school, during clinics, against the parents' expressed written wishes. This bill prevents schools from hosting those clinics during school hours. Since schools no longer sing Christmas songs for fear of lawsuits, the liability with turning schools into medical facilities is a no brainer!






