Chief Master Sergeant Patrick E Bailey Retires After 30 Years in the Air Force

Congratulations to Chief Master Sergeant Patrick E. Bailey, celebrating his retirement from the United States Air Force on Thursday, March 9, at Luke Air Force Base, Arizona. At the time of his retirement, Chief Master Sergeant Bailey was the Senior Enlisted Leader of the 56th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron.

Patrick is the son of Stan and Sheila Bailey of Pittsfield. He was born in Brattleboro, VT, was raised in Pittsfield with his brother, Michael, and was graduated from Pittsfield Middle High School. He joined the US Air Force in July 1993. In May, Patrick and his wife, Misty, and their children, Amelie and Lucas, will move to Alaska where USAF Captain Misty Bailey is a surgical nurse at Elmendorf Air Force Base.



Chief Bailey has served in a variety of aircraft maintenance

assignments and leadership positions at the unit and squadron level throughout the world. He moved up through the ranks from Airman Basic to Chief Master Sergeant during his 30 years of service.

The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time is not what it seems and everything you wouldn't expect. Christopher Boone, played by Luca J. Pellegrine, tells the story of how he solved the case of his neighbor's dog being slain with a gardening fork, while along the way finding the truth about his mother, bonding with his teacher and learning to accept that his father, faults and all, is more like Christopher than he seems.

Along for the journey are the many witnesses in the town where Christopher lives, and beyond. Friends, acquaintances and strangers alike, shape Christopher's very brave move to not only solve the curious incident but help to become more independent along the way. Christopher is a 15-year-old boy who is on the autism spectrum and rarely departs from his usual routine, but once he realizes there is more to Wellington's death than finding out who did it, he understands that the world is not as it always seemed, and he's going to have to learn to accept help if he is to survive this quest.

Cook's Corner Irish Soda Bread Muffins

Last week we featured Pan Boxty, this week we round out the two-part St. Patrick's Day series with Irish Soda Bread Muffins. You will love these muffins, they are delicious. Serve them with sweet butter, your favorite jam or marmalade or honey. Make a pot of your favorite brew, tea or coffee and enjoy the sweet taste of Ireland! Enjoy. *MP Christakos*

2 & ¼ cups flour 2 tsp baking

powder



¼ tsp baking soda

½ tsp salt

1/3 cup sugar

1 & $\frac{1}{2}$ cups currants (or raisins as a 2nd choice)

1 & $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 tsp caraway seeds

2 large eggs


1 cup plain yogurt or sour cream (do not use fat-free)

6 TBSP melted butter

Coarse or raw sugar for topping Heat oven to 400. Lightly grease standard muffin tins, or line with muffin cup papers that have been sprayed with cooking spray. Whisk together flour baking powder, baking soda, salt, currants (or raisins)

and caraway seeds. In a separate bowl whisk together eggs, yogurt or sour cream and melted butter.

Stir the dry and wet ingredients together. As soon as everything is combined – stop stirring. But the dough will be very sticky, that's okay. Spoon the batter into the prepared muffin tin / paper liners. Top with sprinkled coarse or raw sugar, if desired. Bake for 18 to 20 minutes or until a cake tester inserted into the center of the muffins comes out clean and dry.



On March 9, the House of Representatives met. There were several bills on gun control. HB32 placed more constraints on gun possession in school zones. HB59 added additional background checks. HB78 repealed the state's prohibition to enforce federal overreach, and HB106 established "Red Flag" laws. All were defeated on bi-partisan votes. We thank our Democrat colleagues who voted for the 2nd Amendment.

Another hot topic in this session was the Education Freedom Accounts (EFAs). HB367 changed students' eligibility from 300% of federal poverty guidelines to 350%. This modest increase will raise the income limit by \$9000 but allow more families to participate. HB464 expanded the definition of who is eligible. Both passed on partisan votes. The EFA program has been widely successful and will continue to be promoted by the Republicans. The Democrats have continued to try to derail the freedom accounts but have been primarily unsuccessful. Cyril and I spoke with the nonprofit organization managing this program. They would love to discuss the program with Pittsfield and Chichester parents. **PLEASE LET US KNOW IF YOU ARE INTERESTED** (claytoncyril@claytoncyril4house.com) and we will arrange a meeting.

The third group of bills focused on rental property. HB112 regulated property sale notice. HB117 strengthened the termination of the lease. HB401 controlled notice for property renovation, HB469 forced rental owners to take vouchers, and HB567 required more notice for a prospective rent increase. Only HB117 passed. These votes were more bi-partisan since adding these constraints would only hurt the current rental property availability crisis and make it worse.

The Session was more bi-partisan, though Republicans had more Reps, many Democrats helped us "Get It Right!" It was a long and productive session.

Clayton and Cyril worked with the Merrimack County budget committee to finalize the budget on March 10. The team managed to keep the budget nearly flat at approx. 1.3% increase vs the nearly 3% originally proposed. Sincerely, Representatives *Clayton Wood* and *Cyril Aures*
