"Hummingbirds" continued from Page 1 to look for signs of mold or bacteria. Fresh nectar attracts more hummingbirds. Only fill the feeder with enough nectar for a couple of days, then rinse/wash feeders and refill.

2. Remember to use only sugar and water in your feeders. Red dye is unnecessary and actually can be harmful to your hummingbirds. Instead, choose a feeder that has red incorporated in its design.

Sugar water: 1 part sugar to 4 parts water. Bring water to a boil and add sugar, stirring until sugar dissolves. Let cool, fill feeders, and store extra sugar water in a container in the fridge for up to 2 weeks.

- **3.** Buy only feeders that you can completely take apart. You'll need to be able to access all inner nooks and crannies to be able to clean them thoroughly.
- **4.** Hang your feeder around other plants that attract hummingbirds. This increases the likelihood and speed that the hummingbirds will find your feeder and visit often.

Hummingbirds will come back to you each year if you provide for them. I'm going on the same three visiting for 3 years in a row! Donna Keeley

I hope to take away improved and new art techniques to be able to expand my knowledge on creating artwork.





Cook's Corner Avgolemono Soup and Horiatiki Salata

Orthodox Easter is a significant holiday in my husband's Greek Orthodox family and this year it falls on Sunday, May 2nd. My mother-in-law, fondly known as YiaYia (grandmother in Greek), was a fabulous cook and I was blessed that she taught me how to make many traditional Greek dishes.

Typically the Lenten Fast is broken after midnight Mass on Saturday night with this soup. Avgolemono means "egg lemon". In addition to serving as the base for this Greek classic, Avgolemono is also often prepared as a sauce for grilled meats and vegetables. It's a lovely Spring soup and pairs beautifully with the rustic and delicious Horiatiki Salata.

I hope you will enjoy these two dishes. Stay tuned – next week we'll feature recipes for grilled Lamb Souvlakia and Greek Potatoes. Christos Anesti! (Happy Easter in Greek)

Yia Yia's Avgolemeno Soup (egg / lemon)

2 cans chicken broth (14.5 oz size)
½ can water (use one of the broth cans)
½ cup Orzo
2 eggs, beaten
2 Tbsp cold water
Juice from ½ lemon or about 4 Tbsp bottled
¼ tsp flour

Bring the chicken broth and water to a boil. Add the orzo and simmer for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, in a bowl, beat the eggs, add 2 Tbsp cold water and the flour. After beating the egg mixture, add the lemon juice. Let the orzo / broth cool and then start adding some of the broth to the egg, a little at a time. Be careful, adding too much hot broth to the egg will cause the egg to cook.

Once you've added some broth to the egg, then whisk the rest of the egg/broth into the larger pot of broth / orzo.

In our family we always make it this way, but Avgolemeno is often made with cooked, shredded chicken (preferably rotisserie chicken). We enjoy it the simple way, and serve it with warm pita, feta, and Horiatiki Salata (Village salad).

You can also make the broth only (no orzo), add some cornstarch to thicken and serve it as a sauce. It's great with grilled lamb, lamb meatballs, grilled fish or chicken, over stuffed tomatoes, or roasted artichokes and potatoes.

Horiatiki Salata (Greek Village Salad)

Romaine lettuce
Cucumber, sliced into rounds
Tomatoes, sliced into wedges
Thin sliced sweet yellow or red onion
Greek Kalamata olives
Feta cheese, cut into large blocks
Olive oil
Red wine vinegar
Dried oregano
Fresh ground black pepper

Assemble your salad on a large shallow bowl or platter, starting the with the lettuce and building with the other ingredients, arranged decoratively across the top, finishing with the blocks of Feta. Then drizzle the entire salad with a little olive oil and red wine vinegar, sprinkle with dried oregano and season with fresh ground black pepper.

Serve with warm pita or naan. You will be instantly transported to the lovely Greek islands, surrounded by the beautiful, turquoise Aegean Sea. Bon appetit! - MP Christakos

To my constituents in Pittsfield,

During the week of April 19, my committee met on SB 133, which is an omnibus of 13 separate bills, with different topics – all related to licensing, at least - and different sponsors, some of whom only support their own sections and not the whole bill. It took all day to hold the public hearing, and I set up three subcommittees to analyze it in more depth. The subcommittee I was on worked on section VII, giving the office of professional licensure & certification a structure for investigations and hearings. After we established that this was intended to supplement, not replace, the existing board authority, we asked OPLC for clarification in a few specific areas and will consider their suggested language next week. Another subcommittee dealt with the adoption of two interstate compacts, for occupational therapists and audiology and speech-language pathology. They, too, asked for some clarifying language.

It's interesting to see how differently the Senate operates: there would have been 13 House bills on these topics, and they would have needed separate hearings. But the hearings would have been easier, for us and for the public who had to sit through up to 12 irrelevant sections before they could testify: separate hearings start at specific times, while this one bill hearing started at 10 and ran on past 3. To my constituents in Pittsfield,

During the week of April 12, my committee met on SB 33, which attempts to set up a process to restore Native American place names. Apparently, there is a process available now, and many Native American communities prefer it to the one in the bill. The prime sponsor brought in an amendment to address issues not fixed by the Senate amendment, but his testimony revealed that the Native Americans in this state are not in full agreement on this issue, and many are upset that they were not consulted in its drafting.

SB 57, allowing pharmacy technicians and interns to perform some tasks remotely, also looked simple and straightforward (I'm a co-sponsor), but questions brought out concerns with hacking, how the companies verified that these tasks were performed by the licensed individuals, and other management issues. SB 114, on safe use of public recreation areas, had been amended by the Senate to only require the Police Standards & Training Council provide training on de-escalation, implicit bias, and incidents involving civil rights. It wasn't clear to us if the council already provides such training; they didn't send an officer to testify, which usually means they don't object to the bill.

SB 58, technical corrections to the administration of licensing boards, was, at 51 pages, much longer than most bills in New Hampshire. There was no opposition, but I'm planning a work session to go over it in detail. Representative Carol McGuire, mcguire4house@gmail.com 782-4918
