Congratulations to Maryellen (Minni) Plante on being selected as the 2022 Pittsfield Citizen of the Year!

Most people, when they hear the name, Minni Plante, relate to her Lifeguard and Swimming Instructor days. Minni started as Head Lifeguard at the F.B. Argue Recreation Area (a.k.a. Town Pool or Town Beach area) in the 1970's. She has taught hundreds of children to swim and helped many teens train to be lifeguards. Beyond her lifeguard and swimming instructor duties, Minni has helped to bring many positive changes to the "Town Pool." She was instrumental in expanding the concession stand and offering activities for all ages to enjoy at the Recreation Area. She has also mentored many young "Town Pool" employees and helped them through teenage life. She is always ready to help with the coordination of the Float for Old Home Day and any other projects throughout the summer – all with a positive, inspiring attitude.

For over 50 years, Minni has been involved in and served in leadership roles in many organizations. She is the Chairperson of the Parks & Recreation Commission and has continued to bring Harvestfest, the Easter Egg Hunt and Winterfest to our Community. She has been a long time member of the First Congregational Church - serving on a number of committees. She is a member of the Pittsfield Center Development Corporation (PCDC) and manages the Community Center. ### Sabra Ann (Mayberry) Welch

Sabra Ann (Mayberry) Welch, ARNP, CS, MA, CAGS passed peacefully on Saturday, July 9, 2022, at Concord Hospital. She was born on September 27, 1947, in Lynn, MA, daughter of the late Blanche and Roger Mayberry. She was a graduate of Lynn English High School (1965) and Boston University School of Nursing (1969). She was commissioned a LTJG, USNR in 1975. While stationed at the Naval Hospital, Portsmouth, VA, she met her husband of 45 years LCDR Daniel F. Welch, USN (Ret). After marrying in 1977, and following her Naval service, she continued her education earning her master's degree from the University of North Florida and a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies from The College of William and Mary. She worked for over 40 years in nursing and counseling, focusing on families and youth, including many years in private practice in Bow.

A resident of Pittsfield for 35 years, she was deeply involved in the community as a member of the Pittsfield Historical Society, parishioner and vestry member at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, troop committee member and merit badge counselor for Boy Scout Troop 84, and an active supporter of several local youth organizations.

Her interests and hobbies were expansive. She was an avid researcher of a variety of topics, inspiring a long-time relationship with the Canterbury Shaker Village where she spearheaded the research, interpretation, and opening of the village infirmary building and countless other projects. She also had a close relationship with the active Shaker community at Sabbathday Lake Shaker Village. She embraced her son John's interest in historical reenacting and ran an 18th-c. tavern called "The Brown Dog" - a nod to the beloved family Labrador, Spotless. Throughout her life Sabra took great delight in traveling and enjoyed the opportunity to live abroad in Thailand and a treasured three years in Spain. Her love of travel and community came through in her cooking. She was particularly known for her baked beans and her fudge sauce. Her talents knew no bounds - she loved arranging flowers, event planning, and sewing, especially for those around her.

Sabra is survived by her husband Daniel of Pittsfield, son, ENS John (Rob) Welch, USN, of Williamsburg, VA, and stepdaughters, Cathy Sanford of Baton Rouge, LA, and Deidre Rief of Fort Walton Beach, FL.

A memorial service was held at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, Pittsfield, on Saturday, July 16. Internment will be at the New Hampshire Veterans Cemetery at the convenience of the family.

## Select Board Review July 12, 2022

Road agent Noel Gaboury came in to discuss hiring a replacement for an open position of equipment operator in the highway department. In order to prepare for not only snow plowing needs that will arrive before we know it, there may be retirement issues we'll have at some point down the road, so he was encouraged to solicit a competent employee. Noel also wanted to discuss the upcoming curb/sidewalk and paving that will take place on Park Street. This project will benefit the town as a whole and PYW at the top of Park St., however parking for some apartments that has been taking place on the town right-of-way will be affected. Residents with parking issues should contact their landlords who ultimately are responsible, not only on Park Street, but anywhere in town that space for vehicles is an issue. Some of the planned road improvement projects that were budgeted last March must be put on hold due to soaring costs to operate. Our fuel appropriation is already exhausted and we're only half way through the year. The upcoming year will require serious decisions by voters because there is no way the town can continue to operate as we have been without significantly higher expenditures and thus higher taxes. Majority will rule; cut wherever we can, or bite the bullet and pay more. Taxes have been pretty stable for a number of years, but may be very difficult to restrain next year. Interviews were conducted with the 5 residents that stepped up to apply to fill the vacant school board seat until next March. The state legislature designated the select board to fill vacant seats on the school board when that board was at an impasse on the decision. Adam Cote, Jody Cunningham, Louie Houle, Bill Miskoe and Dan Schroth all presented themselves well and gave us plenty to digest before we make a decision at a special meeting on July 20. *Carl Anderson*

## Pittsfield Sure Does Love Fireworks

The first Old Home Day celebration included a fireworks display, but it is likely the citizens had enjoyed fireworks prior to 1901. Historians believe fireworks were originally developed in the second century BC in China. The first natural "firecrackers" were likely bamboo stalks that when thrown in a fire, would explode with a bang because of the overheating of the hollow air pockets in the bamboo. Around 600-900 AD, legend has it that a Chinese alchemist mixed potassium nitrate, sulfur and charcoal to produce a black, flaky powder – the first "gunpowder". This powder was poured into hollowed out bamboo sticks forming the first man-made fireworks. In the United States fireworks were part of the first Independence Day – a tradition that continues every 4th of July when we celebrate as John Adams had hoped "with pomp, parade .... bonfires and illuminations from one end of this continent to the other." *American Pyrotechnics Association*



During the 18th and 19th centuries fireworks became a part of all sorts of celebrations, so *of course* they were a highlight of Pittsfield's original Old Home Day. And we all know that families find all sorts of reasons to light up backyard displays throughout the year. Pittsfield never tires of good firework shows. We all look forward to the Old Home Day and Balloon Rally displays, with crowds drawn to both events. Come on down to Drake Field to wrap up Old Home Day as fireworks illuminate the summer sky! *Old Home Day Committee*

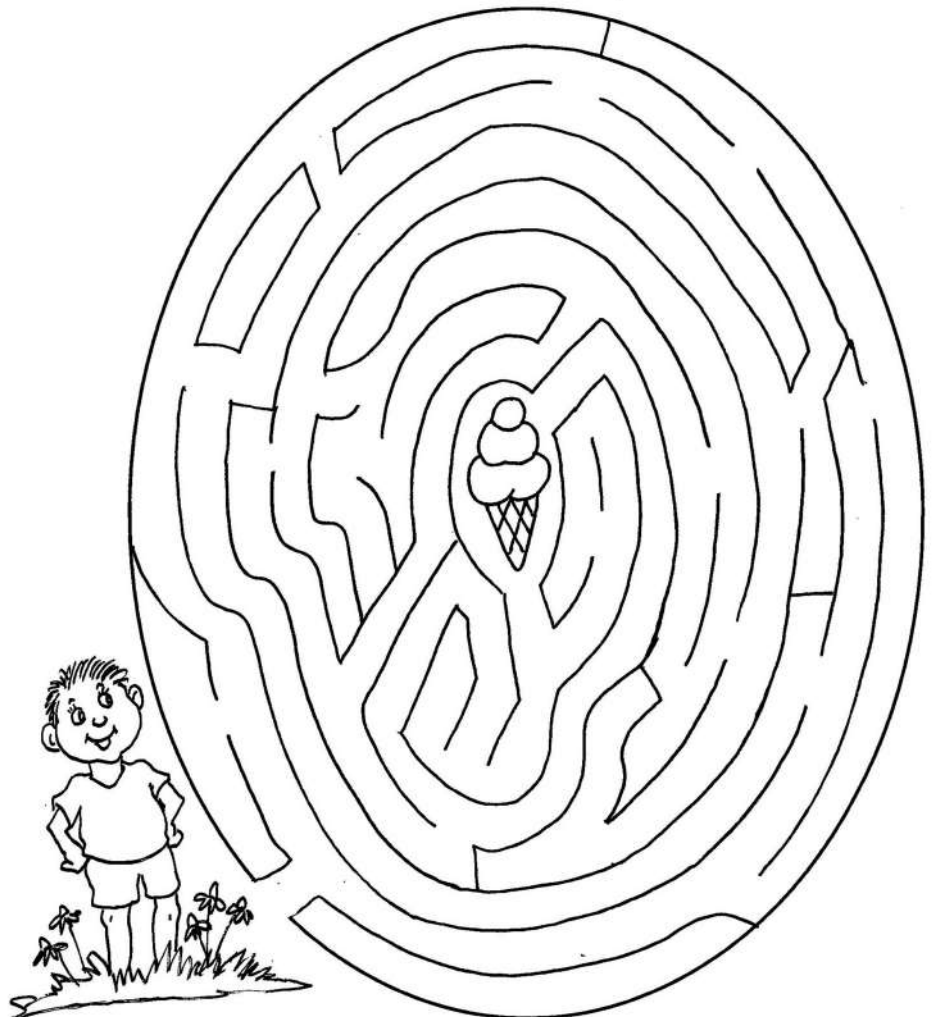

## **Cook's Corner**

### **Summertime Ice Pops**

There's nothing like a frozen sweet treat on a hot summer afternoon. With Old Home Day and then Balloon Rally on the horizon, plan to make a batch of these to share with guests during the festivities. Here we offer up four ideas for ice pops that are easy and fun to make and are certain to bring smiles all around when the temps rise. The chocolate pops are named for one of our grandsons, Jack Fletcher – he loves them! Don't forget to shop locally for your fresh berries and watermelon. Enjoy! *MP Christakos*

#### **Blueberry or Strawberry Ice Pops**

2 cups blueberries (washed) or 2 cups strawberries (washed, sliced & remove the green tops)

¼ apple juice

2 TBSP honey

½ lemon, juiced

1 pinch of salt

Combine everything in a blender and mix on low until smooth. Pour into ice pop molds or pouches and freeze at least 4 hours.

#### **Pineapple Cream Ice Pops**

2 & ½ cups pineapple chunks (packed in juice), drained

3 TBSP orange juice

1 TBSP honey

2 cups vanilla Greek yogurt

Puree the pineapple, OJ and honey in a blender until smooth. Put about 2 TBSP of the mixture into the ice pop mold or pouch, then top with 2 TBSP of the vanilla yogurt, then repeat the layers until done. Freeze for at least 4 hours.

#### **Strawberry or Raspberry & Watermelon Ice Pops**

2 cups watermelon chunks

1 cup fresh strawberries or raspberries (washed, trimmed & sliced)

1 cup orange juice

2 TBSP lime juice

1 TBSP honey

Combine everything in the blender and mix on low until smooth. Pour into ice pop molds or pouches. Freeze for at least 4 hours.

#### **Jack Fletcher's Chocolate Ice Pops**

¾ cup sugar

3 TBSP flour

3 TBSP baking cocoa

4 cups whole milk

In a large saucepan, combine sugar, flour and cocoa. Gradually stir in milk until smooth. Bring the mixture to a low boil over medium heat, cook and stir about 2 minutes until it thickens. Let it cool slightly before filling your ice pop molds or pouches. Freeze for at least 4 hours.

## **Let the Doors Swing Open at Pittsfield Historical Society's Grand Opening, Saturday, July 23**

Joe McQuaid, editor-at-large, Union Leader and NH Sunday News, will be the keynote speaker when the Pittsfield Historical Society opens its new museum and headquarters at 4 Oak St., Saturday, July 23, at 2 pm.

Associated with the statewide newspapers for more than 50 years, McQuaid began his career as a reporter/photographer, making his way up the ladder to eventually become publisher. He reported from Europe and the Mideast, and for a short time in Afghanistan with the NH National Guard's Charlie Company, its only infantry unit. He was presented with the Yankee Quill Award, given by NE editors and publishers, and has written several books, including one about the Mount Washington Cog Railway.

Special guest will be Carole Richardson of the Pittsfield Select Board.

Welcoming the gathering will be Liz Dimmick, president of the Society. Larry Berkson, town historian and PHS board member, will acknowledge donors and supporters of this project that took nearly five years to complete.

Concluding the program will be a ribbon cutting ceremony. Docents will be available throughout the two-story building to answer questions regarding the exhibits. Guests may feel free to wander the halls and visit the commemorative brick patio at the back of the building.
