Select Board Meeting May 26, 2020

The meeting began with mixed emotions- a drastically curtailed (compliments of Covid-19) "retirement party" for George Batchelder, commemorating 40 years of dedicated service to the highway department. The board voted to rename the road off Dowboro, previously Public Works Way, to George Batchelder Way, to serve as a lasting tribute to a man who has dedicated his career to Pittsfield. It's going to take a long time to get used to George not heading the highway dept.

We consider the town lucky to have another capable Pittsfield hometown "boy" step into George's position, contractor Scott Aubertin, whose contract we signed. We have every confidence that Pittsfield will continue to have roads that are the envy of our neighbors.

We voted to advance Dylan Sargent, from volunteer member of the Fire Department Support Company, to paid firefighter now that he has reached the age of 18. Dylan has nearly completed his EMT training, and once tested, can fill both positions. Seeing young people come up through the ranks and stay with Pittsfield is heartening, to say the least.

Restrictions on town buildings will remain in place another two weeks.

Like everywhere else, Pittsfield is struggling to accommodate the difficulties, forced on us by the pandemic, by trying to find alternative ways of doing business and carrying on, as near to normal, as circumstances allow. We may not be happy about the changes, but we are coping. *Carl Anderson*

To my constituents in Pittsfield,

This week, House committees continued working remotely. I met with the Criminal Justice committee on my HB 1580, regulating drones. They had many questions, but a friend on the committee told me they'd had no real issue with the penalties, which was their main responsibility, and they recommended it to pass.

I also met with the Judiciary committee on HB 1642, prohibiting face recognition programs. This was a lot tougher; one group was concerned that these programs would not be able to be used to identify victims; another that it might hamper police investigations (well, yes, that's the point!) Others just

didn't like the bill for some reason. I worked with the sponsor and some committee members on an amendment that greatly simplified the bill while keeping the main points: the police would need a warrant to use this technology, and the DMV database would not be used for any reason. I got drafted to replace a committee member who'd had a death in the family, so I got to argue with them about the amendment. With three of us in favor and five vocally opposed (the others were mostly silent), the vote was 8-11 on adopting the amendment, and 12-7 in favor of killing the bill. I did get some tips on improving it for next year, at least!

Cook's Corner Shrimp Scampi 3 Different Ways!



1 lb large shrimp, raw, peeled & deveined (SAVE THE SHELLS)

4 tsp garlic, minced

Salt & pepper

Olive oil

Crushed red pepper – a pinch

½ cup dry white wine

1/4 cup Shrimp stock (SEE RECIPE BELOW)

1 Tbsp lemon juice

3 Tbsp cold butter

¼ cup fresh, chopped Italian flat leaf parsley

In a bowl, toss the shrimp with 1 tsp of garlic and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp kosher or sea salt.

Heat about a Tbsp of olive oil in a skillet, add shrimp and cook for about 2 minutes. Transfer to a plate and keep warm.

Reduce heat in the skillet, add 1 Tbsp garlic and a pinch of crushed red pepper flakes, cook for about 15 seconds.

Add the wine, heat to high, boil until reduced, about 2 to 3 minutes.

Add the shrimp stock and lemon juice, boil for about 30 seconds. REMOVE from heat. Stir in butter until melted. Return the shrimp to the sauce in the pan.

Season with salt & pepper and more lemon juice if desired.

Serve over pasta with extra lemon, fresh grated Parmesan, salad and crusty rolls. Mangia!

VARIATIONS

<u>Caper & Tomato</u>: Add 2 tsp drained capers and 1 cup halved cherry tomatoes and 1 Tbsp olive oil when sauteeing the garlic & red pepper.

<u>Mustard & Thyme</u>: When sauteeing the garlic, replace the red pepper flakes with 2 tsp of country style Dijon mustard and 1 tsp of minced fresh thyme. And replace the white wine with dry vermouth.

<u>Shrimp Stock:</u> Place shrimp shells and a whole clove of garlic in a saucepan.

Add 1 and ¼ cup of water and a little salt. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer for 5 minutes. Strain the stock through a fine meshed sieve. Discard the solids. You can refrigerate the stock for up to 2 days, or freeze it for up to 3 months. MP Christakos




