The Cannoli Stop to Open in Pittsfield

Some of you are likely familiar with *The Cannoli Stop* on Loudon Road in Concord. Well, we have great news. Soon you can enjoy getting all of your favorite goodies right here in Pittsfield.

Melinda and Nick Sergi were looking to expand their highly successful business by opening another store. Through their friendship with Tracy Hyuck, who owns Main Street Variety, they were inspired to explore locations here in town and settled on a spot at 7 Leavitt Road, just behind the car wash.

The Sergi's met over 20 years ago. Nick's family is originally from Sicily, Italy and he inherited many family recipes for cannoli, as well as other treats. Melinda hails from Vermont, and founded a bakery in Goffstown, NH. The two met, combined their baking and cooking skills, and the rest is history.

The new Pittsfield store will feature everything on their full menu. Starting with the sweets, they have 50 different cannoli fillings, all homemade, fresh daily. In addition to sweet fillings, Melinda shared, "one of our most popular cannoli is jalapeno and bacon". Who knew? They also have a wide range of other sweets including cannoli-filled double layer cakes, regular cakes with cannoli filling as frosting, cupcakes (mini, regular and jumbo). You'll also find fresh baked goodies including chocolate dipped Oreos, cheesecake, over 20 flavors of macaroons, Whoopie Pies, cannoli frozen cookie sandwiches, gelato, and their unique specialty - chocolate dipped bacon. All cannolis are made fresh when you order. On the savory side, they will feature sub sandwiches, served on their homemade sub that are partially baked each day and then they finish baking the bread when you order. It doesn't get fresher than that!

In addition to subs, they also make calzones, with over a dozen different filling choices; and they use their special turnover dough, making them light and flaky. There are also about a dozen different full dinner options, including Chicken Parmesan,



Lasagna, and their famous one-pound meatball. All dinners come with a salad and fresh garlic bread.

The judges chose Miss Osgood because "she had for so many years been very solicitous of the welfare of the sick and confined, and had done so much for the people of Pittsfield." *Valley Times, February 1, 1957*. The inaugural award was announced at a Citizen of the Year dance which was supported and organized by every community group active at that time; and the dance was held at Greenleaf Auditorium in Pittsfield High School. The dance was a fundraiser for development of the "pool area on Clark Street," which is now our beloved FB Argue Recreation Area. The practice of the February announcement and dance continued for many years before shifting to Old Home Day with recognition of the new Citizen of the Year during the annual parade.

This year the tradition continues. People who were previously honored to be the Citizen of the Year will gather to read nominations and select the recipient. One constant will be that the person chosen will have "done so much for the people of Pittsfield." The 2022 Citizen of the Year will be honored and receive a celebratory welcome at the Old Home Day parade reviewing stand. In addition, there will be a formal introduction and expressions of gratitude prior to the evening Never's Band concert at Drake Field. Cook's Corner

It's been said more than once that breakfast is the most important meal of the day. Here are two ideas that will have you and your family kicking off the day to a healthy start. When our girls were in high school, I used to make a batch of the muffin egg bites on Sunday evening for a great 'grab & go' meal during the busy week. The homemade breakfast sausage is also a family tradition. And with this recipe, at least you know for sure what's in your sausage. Both of these freeze very well and are easy to reheat. Don't forget, there's always breakfast for dinner, too! Enjoy. *MP Christakos*

Muffin Pan Egg Bites

8 large eggs

½ cup milk

1/4 tsp each salt & black pepper

6 TBSP shredded cheese – Cheddar, Sharp, Monterey Jack – your choice

³⁄₄ cup each of any of the following or combination of fillers:

Ham, cooked bacon or sausage, broccoli, finely chopped red onion, finely chopped green or red bell peppers, fresh herbs, chopped sun dried tomatoes – use your imagination

Heat oven to 325F.

Beat the eggs, milk, salt & pepper together in a large

bowl or measuring cup with a spout for pouring.

Generously coat a 12-cup muffin pan with cooking spray. Divide the chopped fillings into each muffin cup, top each with shredded cheese, then top with the egg mixture.

Very carefully, transfer the muffin tray to the oven. Bake for about 25 minutes until the egg is set and the tops are slightly browned.

You can eat these right away, or when they've cooled, they can be refrigerated or frozen in an airtight container. To reheat, wrap 2 egg muffins in a paper towel and heat in the microwave for 30 to 60 seconds

Homemade Breakfast Sausage

1/4 cup good quality maple syrup

- 1 TBSP fresh thyme, chopped
- 1 TBSP fresh sage, chopped
- 1 & ½ tsp coarse or Kosher salt
- ³⁄₄ tsp fresh ground black pepper
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 lb ground turkey
- 1 lb ground pork
- 8 tsp vegetable oil

Gently combine all ingredients – except the oil. Shape the mixture into 16 patties. Heat oil in a large skillet, cook the patties in the oil, in batches if necessary, for 2 to 3 minutes per side or until done.



Select Board Review June 28, 2022

Surveyor Hank Amsden was in for an update of their progress finding the bounds of a couple of town owned properties, and also the layout of Park and Franklin St. These old bounds are all coming together quite well and it looks like we'll be able to identify where all our lines are.

A public hearing was held and a subsequent positive vote taken to accept the donations from Pittsfield Firefighter's Assoc. and the NH Charitable Foundation that allows the purchase of a UTV for the fire dept. The cost is covered 100%. Pete, Rob and Mike traveled to Buffalo last week on behalf of the Fire Dept to take possession of a government surplus cargo trailer that will be used to transport the UTV. Their time and Mike's truck were donated so with the exception of fuel and tolls for the trip, the cost of the whole package to the town is a few hundred dollars. The benefit could be dramatic under certain circumstances, which we will now be prepared for. Thanks to all who had a hand in it.

We discussed the process of awarding the Boston Post Cane. With the passing of Ruth Huckins, the next honoree is being sought. If you know of anyone, or think you could be the oldest person domiciled (your "home" but not necessarily where you live now) in Pittsfield, please contact the Town Hall at 435-6773.
