COL. KRISTOFERSON, Ralph "Kris" Severin

On October 4, 2020, the Greatest Generation lost another member and we lost a beloved father, grandfather, great-grandfather and friend. Ralph "Kris" Severin Kristoferson died in Denton, TX,

at the age of 95 after an extended illness.

He was born in Silverhill, AL, on April 26, 1925, the son of Swedish immigrants, Joel Severin Kristoferson and Britta Westman Kristoferson. As an only child who lived through the Depression and lost his father as a teenager, Ralph (who as an adult preferred to be called Kris) learned about responsibility at an early age.

When he was two, his parents moved to New York to take jobs as a chauffeur and housemaid on the Long Island estate of the owner of the RCA Victrola Company. His father, Joel, was a mechanic and toolmaker who eventually owned a garage across the street from the Brooklyn Dodgers baseball stadium. Upon entering public school, Ralph was identified as being highly intelligent and was enrolled in a fast-track academic program that allowed him to complete two years of school each year. His father developed stomach ulcers and the family moved back to Stockholm with the hopes that the fresh air might improve his health. Ralph completed public school and attended university. Fearing what he was learning about Hitler, Joel ordered the family to leave Sweden immediately. They fled by train and ship just one day before Hitler invaded Poland.

After returning to America, Ralph's parents bought a small farm in Center Barnstead, NH, and raised chickens. Ralph was held back by several grades so he could attend nearby Pittsfield High School with students closer to his age. Joel was ordered back to New York to help with the war effort. He helped to design and manufacture the Norden bomb site which allowed US bombers to more precisely drop bombs during WW II. Britta moved back to New York to care for her ailing husband, leaving Ralph to complete high school in Pittsfield. Joel died when Ralph was 16.

Ralph first caught a glimpse of Dorothy with her blonde braids, as she parked her bike in front of his father's car near the Pittsfield hardware store. He was the Senior Class President and she was the Junior Class President. They went to the Senior Prom together.

Ralph wanted to become an engineer. He excelled on the qualifying exam and received a Senatorial appointment to West Point, the U.S. Military Academy. His education there was compressed into three years due to WW II. While studying at West Point his entire class was taken out West, placed in trenches, and they observed the very first test release of an atom bomb. Shortly after his graduation in 1945, Ralph was shipped out to Germany. After serving there, the Army sent him to MIT where he received a Master's Degree in Civil Engineering.

Ralph married our mother, Dorothy Elizabeth Freese, on June 25, 1949, at her parent's lake house in Alton Bay, NH.

During his military career our father, who by now went by Kris, was posted to St.Louis; Fort Belvoir, VA; Korea; Fort Leavenworth, KS; The British Staff College at Camberley, England; Landenmark (NATO) Copenhagen; Fort Campbell, KY; Alexandria, VA, Vietnam; the Army War College, Carlisle, PA; and Fort Worth, TX. He later shared that he especially enjoyed his time in England and Denmark. While serving as a Battalion Commander at Fort Campbell he oversaw the creation of a massive tent city to provide food and shelter for the troops that were enforcing the desegregation of Ole Miss for James Meredith, a cause that he strongly supported. While also serving at Fort Campbell he and his troops were on standby on the tarmac, ready to be airlifted, if necessary, during the Cuban Missile Crisis.

His last military assignment was as District Engineer in Fort Worth. For three years he oversaw all of the Army Corps of Engineer projects in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas. After 26 years in the Army, Kris retired in 1971 with the rank of Colonel. He had served the United States in WW II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War.

Upon retirement, Kris was immediately hired to serve as the Director of Facilities, Planning and Construction, for the University of Texas System. He supervised all the planning, construction and renovations of 15 University of Texas campuses and medical schools. During his tenure he planned for, and supervised, the Kristoferson construction of at least four new college campuses within the University of Texas system. At one point he told his classmates who were attending his 50th high school reunion that he loved his job and never wanted to retire. Kris did eventually retire in 1994 prior to UT's mandatory retirement age of 70.

Kris stressed the importance of saving and using money carefully. He and Dorothy were strong advocates for higher education and made sure that all 5 of their children had whatever education they needed to accomplish their career goals. They also helped some of their children's spouses with their educational expenses. Kris thought that it was imperative that his children work towards the goal of owning their homes, free from debt. He also felt that it was important to travel and be exposed to people and ideas from other cultures.

Kris was thoughtful, generous, organized, smart, and humble. He was respected by all who met him. Each day began with solving a crossword puzzle while drinking a cup of black coffee. He was a tinkerer who liked working on cars, making furniture, and repairing anything that was broken. He liked playing chess but bridge was his passion and he absolutely loved back massages. He developed a love of classical guitar music while on a trip to visit friends in Spain and had an impressive collection of guitar CDs at his disposal. He spoke Swedish and German, and picked up quite a bit of Danish while living in Denmark. Kris was a staunch supporter of the University of Texas Lady Longhorn basketball team, enjoyed watching UT football games and Texas Rangers baseball games.

After Dorothy and Kris bought a lake cabin in New Hampshire he took up sailing. At first, he bought a couple of small sailboats called Sunfishes but soon graduated to his beloved Catamaran. He totally enjoyed being on that boat, even when the winds died down and he spent hours becalmed in the middle of the lake.

Kris was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Austin, TX, and served as Chair of the Finance Committee. After he and Dorothy moved to a retirement community in Denton, TX, he faithfully attended Sunday School and church at the First United Methodist Church. Dorothy and Kris purchased and donated the current parsonage to the First Congregational Church in Pittsfield.

Kris was predeceased by his parents and his wife, Dorothy Freese Kristoferson. He is survived by his children: Karen Foxworth (Bill), Susan Kristoferson (Larry Kapustka), John Kristoferson (Sandy); David Kristoferson, and Elizabeth Moore (John). His grandchildren include: Briana Foxworth, Asher Kristoferson, Joel Kristoferson (Tara), Kari Chambers (Patrick), Kyle Kristoferson (Susan), Courtland Kristoferson, Severin Kristoferson, Jett Kristoferson, Jory Kristoferson; Kendall Moore, and Avery Moore. His great grandchildren include Bridget Kristoferson, Matthew Kristoferson, Hudson Chambers, and Ellie Chambers. In addition, his 3 step-grandchildren include Tanya Ming, Gabe Kapustka, and Erica Witbeck (Gerry); His step-great grandchildren include Chance Ming, Ethen Ming, Lydia Ming Bowie (Brent), Lilly Ming, Calvin Witbeck, and Saskia Witbeck. Wyatt Bowie is his only step-great grandchild.

A Covid delayed graveside service will be held at 10:30 am on Tuesday, Oct. 4, at Floral Park Cemetery in Pittsfield.

School Board Update

At our meeting on September 15th, Charlene Vary, our new Director of Student Services in the district, presented the Board a report on the PHS Flex Program. This tiered intervention support is intended for high school students in critical need as a dropout prevention, behavior management and credit recovery program for students grades 9-12+. Ms. Vary also shared that as of September 12th, the district still has 2 open paraprofessional positions at PES, 5 at the middle school and 4 at the high school. 
Mr. Lane's report highlighted his process towards building the '23-'24 budget to be brought to the Board the first week of October. To better plan for the long-term, Mr. Lane has begun the process of establishing replacement cycles for furniture and technology. Mr. Lane is also bringing forward a suggested change to restructure the pay scale for hourly employees of the district.

At our next meeting, Mr. Lane will present the Board with a presentation for an upcoming Tuition Study meeting with community members. Once this presentation is approved, it will be posted for the public for viewing and consideration. The Board will then host an informational meeting about the Tuition Study findings on Thursday, October 27 at 6:30 at PMHS (further details to follow).

Finally, the Board encourages community members to attend our meetings. One of our jobs as a board is to review, revise and adopt policies for the district. Policies under review are posted with the Board packet for community review prior to the meeting. If the policy is up for a first reading, it will simply be available to view and ask questions on. The second read is typically when the Board discusses the policy as well as any suggested changes to the policy. A policy may need to be tabled for additional discussion and review. If you have a question about how policy review happens, please reach out to Mr. Lane at the SAU or the Board chair or co-chair.

Cook's Corner Pumpkin Apple Bisque

Here's a lovely Fall paring to help you kick off soup and sammie season! This soup is absolutely delicious; in fact, it's downright

luxurious. If you're feeling fancy, you can drizzle a little plain Greek yogurt on the soup when serving and you'll definitely want to add a few turns of fresh ground black pepper. For a robust meal, I like to team this bisque with my all-time favorite grilled ham / Cheddar & apple on sourdough sammie. Be sure to splurge on a really good quality, grainy mustard, you won't regret it. *MP Christakos*

14 cup chopped onion

- 2 stalks chopped celery
- 2 apples, peeled & sliced

2 cups vegetable or chicken broth

2 cups apple cider

- 1/4 cup dark brown sugar
- 1 TBSP curry powder
- 1 tsp ground cumin
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 4 cups heavy cream
- 4 cups pumpkin puree

In a large stock pot, saute the onions and celery until translucent, about 5 to 6 minutes. Add apples, cider, vegetable (or chicken) broth, brown sugar and the spices. Bring to a simmer and cook until vegetables are soft, about 5 to 8 minutes.

Let the mixture cool a bit. Then transfer to a blender, remove the center cap and cover with a dish towel. Puree the mixture in the blender until smooth. Or you can leave the mixture in the pot and use an immersion blender.

Return the mixture back to the pot. Add the cream and the pumpkin puree. Mix well with a whisk until everything is combined and bring back to a low boil to reheat.

Serve with homemade biscuits or cornbread. Or, make my favorite grilled cheese sammie – sourdough bread, ham, sliced sharp cheddar, thin apple slices and a good, grainy mustard. Build the sammies, spray the bread with cooking spray and

grill in a skillet until golden brown.
